

# Celebration of Learning Newsletter Autumn 1

Dear parents and carers,

It has been wonderful to see the children after the summer break and they have settled in marvellously to the new school year. Walking around the school, many visitors have commented on how they can feel a real buzz for learning in the air and the children have really embraced all of the challenges given to them.

They have also exhibited our school drivers diligently in 'being a force for positive change' and reading widely and enthusiastically. In the short time we have been back at school, we have already given out numerous certificates for reading and being a force for positive change. We are very proud of the dedication the children have shown!

In class and out of class, there have been many wonderful learning experiences along with some exciting enrichment opportunities for the children to take part in.

Please see all of the wonderful learning and events which have happened at Enfield Heights during Autumn 1.

### Reception

Our Sunflowers Class have been a wonderful addition to our Enfield Heights' family. They have settled in extremely well, showing excellent behaviours for learning and demonstrating our school values both in class and around the school.

During their first weeks of school, the children have enjoyed learning about 'families'. They enjoyed painting their own houses and have brought in their family photos which we have shared in class. We spoke about our families and who lives with us at home.



This half term in maths, the children have learned about number recognition. We have focused on recognising and writing numbers from 0-5. We had also learnt about matching quantities to the number shown.

In Literacy our focus book was 'The great big book of families' and 'So much'. The book highlighted the fact that families come in all shapes and sizes, celebrating diversity and explaining how every personal situation is different.



#### Year 1

In English this half term, Year 1 have been focusing on the book 'The weather monster'. We have retold the story with lots of oral rehearsal and have used capital letters and full stops to write simple sentences. The children have written their own endings for the story whereby they have used a story map to plan their story ending. We have also written a postcard from the main character, Ron, telling the readers about his holiday.

In maths this half term, Year 1 have been focusing on place value, adding, 2D shapes and halves. Children have begun to count beyond 20, order numbers to 20 and add within 20 using the part part whole model. They used manipulatives to support including numicon, cubes and counters. The children have been learning to halve objects and shapes by cutting, folding and colouring.

In science year 1 have been learning all about the seasons. Children have produced excellent projects at home including weather vanes and spinners. In class, we have made wind socks to measure the weather and rain gauges to collect and measure the amount of rain across a week. We have become scientists by measuring and recording data.

#### Year 2

In our English lessons, we have explored expanded noun phrases to describe personality and appearance of different characters. Our recent creative writing task involved creating a character description of the "Everywhere Bear." We've also focused on retelling fiction and non- fiction events with an emphasis on past tense, time conjunctions and compound sentences.

In maths, we have been delving into the world of numbers, focusing on place value up to 100. Children have been identifying tens and ones in various numbers; they compared one- and two-digit numbers. We explored odd and even numbers and looked at different number patterns in a two-digit number. Using the "Build it, Draw it, Write it, Say it" model, allowed pupils to explore addition in stimulating ways, such as partitioning numbers, part- part whole models and bar models. We've introduced the magical world of multiplication by diving into the 2 times tables. All children have been discovering repeated addition patterns and laying strong foundation of number.


In geography, we have embarked on a journey around our local area. Children have identified and named both human and physical features, deepening their connection to our community. After our local walk, children built and labelled a local are map. In science, children went on a quest to identify living, dead, and non-living objects in their surroundings. The classic tale of "The Gruffalo" served as an inspiring framework for our exploration of food chains. In our discussions about the essential needs of animals, we explored topics such as food, water, shelter, and protection. The children have gained a deeper appreciation for the challenges animals face in their search for survival.

In PSHE, children have been learning about their roles and responsibilities within the classroom. They've engaged in thoughtful conversations about good and poor behaviour and the potential consequences of their actions.

I am extremely proud of the enthusiasm and dedication all children have shown in their learning this half term.







In English this half term Year 3 have been studying the story of Rama and Sita. We have written acrostic poems about it, create character and setting descriptions and even rewritten the tale using expanded noun phrases, adverbs and amazing vocabulary.

In maths the children have been adding and subtracting three digit numbers. We have also been studying statistics and even made a bar chart using our bodies. The children have also been exploring the properties of 2D shapes and angles.

In the wider curriculum 3C have studied light in science. They conducted an experiment to see how much light they needed to see objects in the dark. We have also been studying Hinduism in RE and exploring the festival of Diwali. We explored sculpting and made some Diya lamps in art and some traditional rangoli patterns.

We also enjoyed Hispanic Culture day, an African music workshop and a Black History month workshop. We've been so busy!





This half term, the Year 4 students have been diving deep into the world of numbers and operations. They've been working diligently to enhance their understanding of the four operations: addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. In the realm of geometry, the Year 4's have been busy exploring 2D shapes and, in particular, different types of triangles and quadrilaterals.


In English, the children have embarked on an exciting journey into the world of literature. They've been immersing themselves in the art of diary writing, crafting their own diary entries. Not only have they been busy creating these personal narratives, but they've also been improving their editing skills, learning the invaluable process of refining their work. In addition to diary entries, the children have been delving into persuasive writing, where they put their powers of persuasion to the test by writing letters to the chairs in their classroom, who had decided to go on strike!

In science, Year 4 has been exploring living things and their habitats. The children had the wonderful opportunity to observe and identify various living organisms in our meadow. Equipped with cameras, they captured images and showcased their scientific prowess by categorising these organisms into a classification key.

This term's learning journey has transported Year 4 all the way to ancient Rome. They've been delving into the fascinating history of the Romans and the reasons behind their invasions, providing a captivating glimpse into the past.

Our Year 4 students have also enjoyed some memorable events. Children have participated in an African Music workshop, where they danced to the rhythm of the continent and explored the rich musical heritage. On Spanish day, the children indulged in various activities, including a Flamenco workshop and children created their own colourful mosaics, immersing themselves in the vibrant culture of Spain.

It's been a great term of learning, and we're excited for more next term!





In maths we have been learning about place value developing our skills of using the formal written method when adding, subtracting and multiplying up to four digits by 2 digits including exchanging. We have also been learning about factors and how numbers can have common factors and completing multi-step word problems.

In English, we enjoyed created and performed our own Tanka poem to one another. We have also written a persuasive letter to Mrs Powrie, encouraging her to allow us to have sweet treats in school. We learnt all about the different features that make up a persuasive piece of writing such as modal verbs, using formal tone and emotive language to attract the reader. We ensured that we included clear points, evidence to support this and an effective explanation.

In Science, we have been developing our skills in predicting, investigating and discovering which materials will dissolve as well as identify and explain irreversible chemical changes. We carried out experiments to identify whether our predictions were correct. For example, comparing how sugar cubes, granulated sugar and castor sugar dissolved using both cold and warm water.

Our class took part in a beatboxing workshop. The children were very enthusiastic and many volunteered to showcase their skills. We were super proud of their efforts and participation. As a part of celebrating Hispanic day, we really enjoyed taking part in a Flamenco workshop, we learnt about the history of dance in Spain and how important music is to the people. We had fun learning different dances and moving our bodies to the music. In addition, we enjoyed taking part in an African music workshop as a part of Black History month. We were able to learn about the history of cultural instruments.

In our Art lessons we have been learning about different artists such as Banksy, Tilt and Steel. We have looked at a variety of their artwork and used this as an inspiration to create our own piece of graffiti artwork.

Finally, our class visited Heron Hall, alongside our sister schools, to take part in a writing and performing workshop. The children were able to have a small introduction to the school and perform a comical murder mystery, trying to identify who the murder was. The children again were able to showcase their amazing acting and writing skills.







In maths, year 6 started the half term focusing on place value. We learnt about different methods to compare and order integers and decimal numbers. Following from this, we reconsolidated our knowledge on rounding numbers to the nearest 10, 100, 1,000, 10,000 and 100,000. In the final weeks of the half term, we turned out focus to working with the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division). We worked with integers and decimal numbers when using these operations and then applied them to reasoning and problem-solving questions.

In English lessons, we started the half term with a focus on narrative writing. Year 6 pupils studied the purpose and effect of expanded noun phrases, relative clauses and dialogue and then applied these to their own narrative pieces. The focus of our narratives was derived from a video - an extract from the Jurassic World film. Children were given the opportunity to act out the scene to explore the use of dialogue - how it builds character and moves the story along. Following on from this text type, we began our study of non-chronological-reports – writing to inform. Children studied the language and structural features of these reports and then wrote their own, focusing on a dinosaur of their choice.

In science, we have been studying evolution and inheritance. Children have learnt about the characteristics that animals and plants inherit from their parents, and compared these to characteristics that are acquired. This knowledge was then developed and applied to the process of adaptation; we looked at how the characteristics of animals and plants make them suited to their surroundings, and how certain living things can survive in extreme environments (such as the arctic and hot deserts).





# Special Events this half term:

## African music workshops

Enfield Heights was extremely lucky to be immersed into a day of African music. All of our children got to enjoy either a performance or a workshop where they learnt about the traditions, history and styles of African influenced music.



# **TFL Workshop Year 6**

Year 6 had a visit from Transport for London, who gave them invaluable advice on travelling on public transport and how to stay safe in preparation for their transition to secondary school! They got to put what they learnt into practise on their recent trip to the Natural History Museum where they travelled by bus and tube.

# **Beatbox Workshop**

It sounded like there was a DJ in the hall! Years 5 and 6 were so lucky to have a Beatbox workshop where they learnt how their voices could be transformed into musical instruments! The children got to experience wonderful performances, try out beatboxing for themselves and even got to witness a beatbox battle between two teachers! You can ask your child who they thought won!

This week we enjoyed celebrating our first Hispanic Culture Day at Enfield Heights! Children participated in an inspiring flamenco dance workshop, cooked tasty Colombian dishes, listened to stories in Spanish and made Hispanic-themed crafts. Our kitchen team prepared a delicious Spanish-inspired menu, while children dressed up in the flag colours of Spanish-speaking countries.
