Dear Parents and Carers,

Yesterday, on 10th of November, as part of Anti-bullying Week, Enfield Heights Academy was taking part in **Odd Socks Day**; a great opportunity for children to express themselves and celebrate their individuality and uniqueness. It was great to see so many children and staff wearing a pair of odd socks today. Each child also designed their own sock for our Anti-Bullying/Kindness display.





By engaging in anti-bullying sessions and proudly wearing odd socks, the children will make it clear that we do not tolerate bullying in any shape or form at Enfield Heights Academy. Throughout the week we will continue to raise awareness about bullying and rehearse our **SPEAK OUT** approach. In the **"Speak Out"** approach" the children are given three steps to dealing with behaviour which makes them unhappy at school.

**Step 1.** If someone makes you unhappy at school through their behaviour or what they say to you, say "**Stop it, I don't like that," –Speak Out.** 

Step 2. If the behaviour continues, try again and say "Stop it, I don't like that," -Speak Out.

**Step 3.** If the behaviour which is making you feel unhappy still continues, find an adult and tell them - **Speak Out.**

## **READING FOR PLEASURE - Why?**

Reading for pleasure opens up new worlds for children. It gives them the opportunity to use their imagination to explore new ideas, visit new places and meet new characters. Interestingly, reading for pleasure also improves children's well-being and empathy. It helps them to understand their own identity, and gives them an insight into the world and the views of others. It might not seem like a particularly important task, but actually, research shows





that reading for pleasure can be directly linked to children's success throughout their time at school and even into adulthood.

# Here are some ideas for encouraging your child to read for pleasure:

| Set aside a special time    | just a few minutes a day is enough to create a reading habit.                     |  |

The Castles Estate Agents kindly agreed to sponsor our Winter Fair again. Back in July we raised £300 for having 30 boards erected at £10 for every board.

The Castles agreed again that there is no upper limit but would aim to have 25/30 boards for this fundraising opportunity to work. This is the easiest £300 we can make to support schools projects-new resources for the children.

The Castles would cover all costs for the board printing, erecting and removal of boards etc. The board company they use are professional and insured. Boards are either stacked into soft ground or tied to gate post with wire. No holes will be drilled into your property. Typically, boards go up to 3-4 weeks before our event and are taken down a week after our fete.
